Building a *Community*

May 2010, the extended community gathered to help build raised garden beds, a compost bin, and to make other garden improvements while sharing food, music, and laughter. Space and resources were provided to several families to plant their own plots, addressing the community need to help adults and children eat healthy food, and to reduce adult and childhood obesity.

Student Learning Outcomes

Students learned about the basic needs of all living things by planting seedlings indoors, later transplanting them in the garden using an organic "square-foot" gardening method.

Students learned of the social. economic and environmental benefits of eating locally grown organic food versus food imported from other regions of the country and beyond, as well as the benefits of composting.

The Lake Superior Stewardship Initiative (LSSI) project has taught our students to think about the watershed in which they live. Most can now name their watershed furthering that sense of as "Lake Superior," and explain what a watershed is. They understand that eating locally grown foods is better for the health of their watershed than areas farther away, and they understand that chemical-free gardening methods are better for the elders. health of their watershed.

This project, overall, has had a positive affect on every "type" of student, including those not usually met by more "traditional" educational methods.

Aside from beautifying a stark, formerly industrial landscape, the C-L-K Elementary Heritage Garden Project has helped foster a "sense of place" for our students. This fulfills part of the mission of the Keweenaw National Historical Park.

Our students have interviewed and recorded garden stories of elderly community members. thus preserving them for generations to come, place, and giving elderly members increased community contact and an outlet for their stories. The students are more aware of all aspects of eating foods shipped from stewardship. This project has widened the students' horizons by connecting them to their community
